

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who died in service to their country. The holiday was officially proclaimed in 1868 to honor Union and Confederate soldiers and was expanded after World War I to honor those who died in all wars. Over one million men and women have been killed in military service since the Civil War, highlighting the magnitude of our heroes' sacrifice.

Many people confuse Memorial Day and *Veterans Day*. Memorial Day is a day for remembering and honoring military personnel who died in the service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. Veterans

Day is the day set aside to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military — wartime or peacetime. Veterans Day is intended to thank living veterans for their service, to acknowledge their contributions to our national security, and to underscore the fact that all those who served — not only those who died — have sacrificed and done their duty.

Regardless of the way we remember the fallen and cherish the living, the staggering numbers of American soldiers who died while fighting in major conflicts should give all of us a greater appreciation of our freedom. It is essential to recognize those who served -- whether it is with parades, ceremonies, social media posts, or simply thanking them for their service. When you thank a veteran for their service, ask them what they did. Each of them, in their own unique way, carved out their own chapter in American history.


